
Resilient nations.

- Energy-efficient and drudgery-reducing devices to replace highcost traditional energy sources
- Mobilizing women's savings and credit groups
- 2001-2003 but activities and mechanisms sustained
- Gender transformation in 1,000+ households
- Reduced burden resulted in economic, political and social empowerment
- Importance of accurate targeting
