On the second year of the “Community actions and city-to-city cooperation on climate change in the Philippines” project, ICLEI Southeast Asia Secretariat and ICLEI Japan Office held a preparatory meeting to gain support and commitment of women leaders and school teachers to join capacity building activities in September. ### **2nd Special Workshop: Promotion of Climate Resilience in Rice and Other Crops, Bangkok, Thailand, 17 June 2014**



The workshop aimed to identify and exchange CCA best practices and regional areas of collaboration among ASEAN Member States. This workshop highlighted commonalities on the good practices, including: 1) use of adaptive planting calendar; 2) planting of improved and stress-tolerant varieties and adoption of technologies for water use efficiency (e.g. alternate wetting and drying); 3) crop diversification (e.g. shrimp farming); and 4) climate risk management via insurance. ### **New research shows the reality of climate-induced migration in Bangladesh**

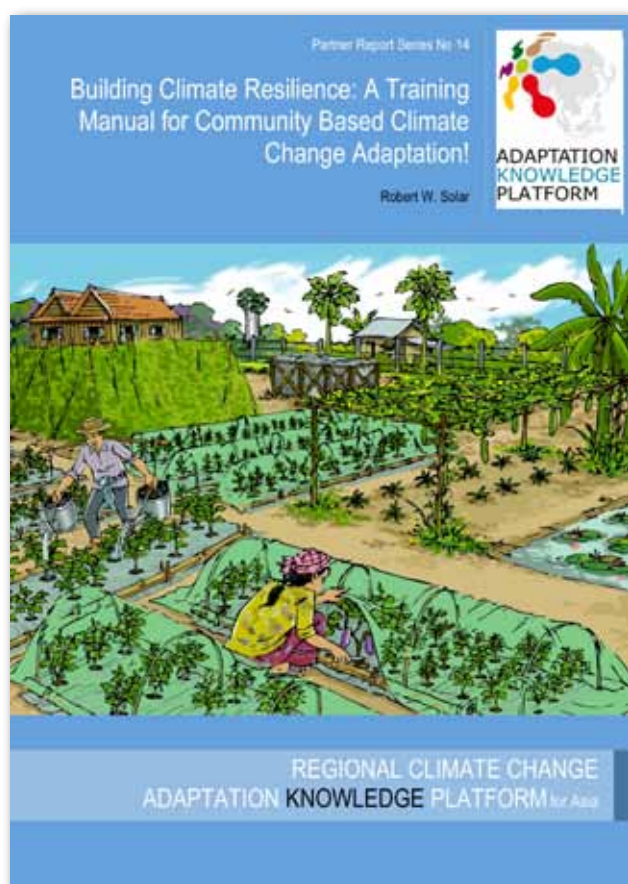

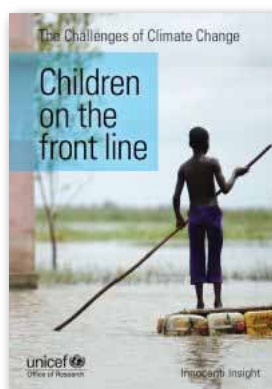
